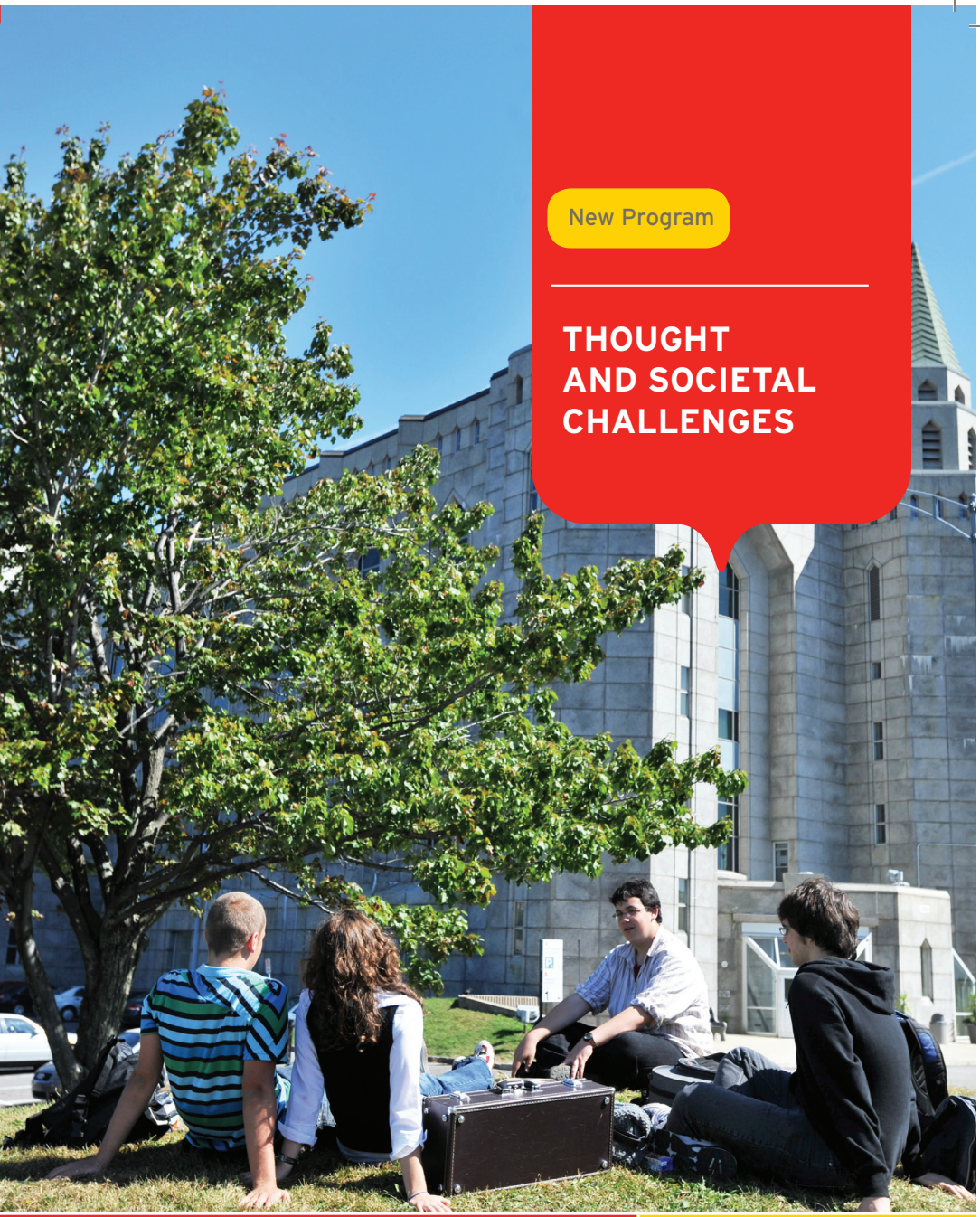
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Are you an undergraduate student? Would you like to spend one or two sessions studying abroad? Would you like to study in English while learning French?

Program summary

The *Thought and Societal Challenges* program is for undergraduate students who want to participate in a mobility program at Université Laval. Courses are given in English, except for one French course offered each session adapted to the student's French proficiency level. The program is designed to make students think about key 21st century issues affecting humans and their environment (philosophy, literature, and sustainable development). Students will also develop more practical knowledge of business administration and entrepreneurship. This program combines disciplinary studies and language learning to help foster students' critical thinking skills and cultural openness so they become engaged, responsible citizens of the world.

Program structure

Students who choose the *Thought and Societal Challenges* program can study full time at Université Laval for one or two semesters, taking 4 to 5 courses each semester (12 to 15 credits). In Québec, the academic year consists of three semesters, each usually lasting 15 weeks: fall (September to December), winter (January to April), and summer (May to August). The suggested academic stream gives students an opportunity to explore an array of fascinating, complementary subjects.

Language requirements

In order to register for the *Thought and Societal Challenges* program, student must have studied in an entirely English-language school or be able to provide proof of proficiency in English. We accept a score equal or better than 750/990 on the TOEIC test.

\*The School of languages will charge activity fees for French as a Foreign Language courses. This applies to all semesters (summer, fall, spring). For 2016, these fees are 92.49 CAD for a 3 credit course. If you have 12 credits of FLE these fees are about 370 CAD. Please take note that for a 5 week intensive French course, these fees are 320 CAD.
